# Public Transportation in Copenhagen – Our Recommendations

The easiest and least expensive way to get around Copenhagen (other than walking or cycling) is to use the public transportation system. Service is frequent and the system is fully integrated, meaning that the same ticket can be used in the metro, bus, train and harbour bus.

We **recommend** that you buy a Day Ticket for the public transportation system. Day Tickets are available as a 24, 48, 72, or 120 hour City Pass or as a 7 day Flexcard. With a City Pass or a Flexcard you can travel as much as you like within zones 1 - 4 (this includes all of central Copenhagen and journeys to and from the airport). Note that you must have your City Pass or Flexcard with you at all times when travelling on the bus, train, and metro as spot checks are done and fines given out.

### Some more details:

## Where to buy your Day Ticket:

- a. From any Metro station ticket machine. The Metro station ticket machines sell all the different City Passes as well as the 7 day Flexcard.
- b. From the red DOT ticket machines at train stations. The red DOT ticket machines only sell the 24 and 72 hour City Passes.
- c. Online: If you have a smartphone with data, the City Passes (but not the Flexcard) can be bought online at https://dinoffentligetransport.dk/citypass.

#### Prices:

- o 24 hour city pass 80 DKK
- o 48 hour city pass 150 DKK
- o 72 hour city pass 200 DKK
- o 120 hour city pass 320 DKK
- o 7 day flexcard 380 DKK

### How to Pay:

 Day Tickets can be bought using a credit card.

#### Validity:

 The City Pass or Flexcard purchased from a ticket machine is valid the moment you purchase it.

If you are arriving in Copenhagen by plane, you'll find the Metro ticket machine by following the signs to the Metro station. (You'll pass the red ticket machines (don't use them), go up the escalator and walk another about 50 metres.)

To the right is a photo of the Metro ticket machine at the airport (Lufthavnen) Metro station. Use that one!
